Course description:

This course will introduce students to the complicated realm of the Post-Soviet area, in particular the Caucasian region. The aim is to discuss the position of the Caucasian region in the system of international relations and through vertical analysis to show the vast complexity of processes and trends in this area with a particular emphasis on the increasing importance of nationalism. The course should make clear the connection between history and present and, together with global and local interplay, reveal their common affects on everyday policies of the three Caucasian countries existing de jure (Armenia, Azerbaijan, Georgia) and three states existing de facto (Abkhazia, South Ossetia, Nagorno-Karabakh). In addition, relations with its neighbours and partners at the global level will be analysed.

Aims and objectives of the course:

To introduce students into the convoluted political situation in the Caucasian region.

To provide students with several perspectives on recent development in this region.

To improve skills in presentation and discussion when debating and giving presentation on actual issues.
